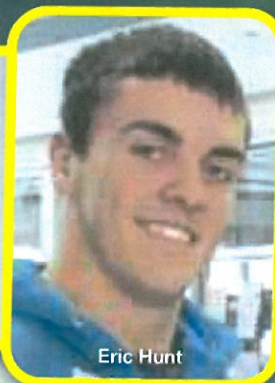

DRUG TESTING

Due to the trend among employers to do drug testing upon employment, effective July 1, 2011, Northlands College will require a drug screening test as part of the entrance requirements in programs where it is a prerequisite of the funding agency or for employment. Applicants who fail the test will not be accepted for training.

FOOD AND REFRESHMENT

Our Buffalo Narrows Program Centre has a student residence where students may purchase meals. The La Ronge and Creighton Program Centers have student lounge areas with vending machines where snacks and drinks may be purchased.

HOUSING

La Ronge has student apartments available for rent for out of town students and their families. Unit sizes include bachelor suites, one and two bedroom suites. All units are furnished with a fridge and stove, but tenants are responsible for providing other necessary furnishings. On site coin operated laundry facilities are available.

Buffalo Narrows has a student residence with 18 double occupancy rooms available to out of town students. Students

are responsible for extra bedding (sheets and a thin blanket are provided), towels and toiletries.

Creighton has a student residence with 15 single occupancy rooms available to out of town students attending either in Creighton or Denare Beach. Students are responsible for food, bedding, personal dishes, towels and toiletries.

SCHOLARSHIPS, BURSARIES AND LOANS

BOARD OF GOVERNORS' SCHOLARSHIP

This scholarship is funded entirely from contributions made by members of the Board of Northlands College. The scholarship is awarded to the most outstanding, full-time Northlands College student, continuing their education.

NORTHLANDS COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP

Four scholarships are awarded annually; one for each of the four regions served by Northlands College. The scholarships are awarded to the most outstanding, full-time post-secondary Northlands College students, continuing their education.

Students may apply for either of these scholarships if they fall within one of the three categories.

1. Student continuing from one full-time post-secondary program to another full-time post-secondary program within Northlands College;
2. Student moving from a year of full-time post-secondary to the next year of full-time post-secondary in the same program at Northlands College;
3. Student going from a Northlands College Program to another institution to complete a post-secondary diploma or degree.

GRADE 12 SCHOLARSHIP

Four scholarships are awarded by Northlands College annually to encourage and assist students in the K-12 system to continue their post-secondary education in the North.

Students may apply for this scholarship if they meet the following guidelines:

1. Grade 12 graduates from the K-12 system.
2. Students enrolled in a full time post-secondary program at Northlands College within one year of graduation from Grade 12.

CENTENNIAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP

Northlands College in conjunction with Advanced Education, Employment and Immigration, Cameco and Lac La Ronge Indian Band Post Secondary award four scholarships annually, two worth \$3,500, and two worth \$1,000.

Students may apply for this scholarship if they fall within one of these two categories.

1. Saskatchewan students under the age of thirty;
2. Saskatchewan students registered in a full-time university or skills training program.

HEALTH

CONTINUING CARE ASSISTANT

– certificate

Entrance requirements: Grade 12. Personal and physical suitability. Security clearance, criminal records check and interview may be required for practicum placements and clinical experiences. Standard First Aid and CPR Heart Saver "C" AED or equivalent required for final practicum placement.

Longer life expectancies, a growing population of senior citizens, more focus on outpatient treatment – these are some of the reasons for the increasing demand for continuing care assistants. Simply put, continuing care assistants are people who care for other people.

Continuing Care Assistant students acquire the skills and knowledge to help people help themselves in their homes and in special care facilities. They receive training in:

- gerontology (a major area of study)
- dementia management strategies
- application of long-term care philosophy in different settings
- promoting independence in a safe environment
- working with people from all cultures
- working with individuals with different levels of physical and cognitive impairment

- administering personal care
- addressing individual psychosocial needs

The demand for continuing care assistants is growing and so are the job opportunities. Graduates could work in a home care setting, long-term care facility, private care home, acute care facility, integrated facility, supportive housing or special needs classroom. Graduates work under the supervision of registered nurses, registered psychiatric nurses and/or licensed practical nurses in home care or special care settings.

HEALTH CAREER ACCESS

Entrance requirements: Grade 12 with English Language Arts A30 & B30. A partial Grade 12 will be considered provided you have the English Language Arts credits and a Social Science credit, intake interview, academic test.

This program is designed for Grade 12 graduates who are interested in pursuing a career in health. MINING

CHEMICAL TECHNICIAN – diploma

Entrance requirements: Grade 12 with a minimum 60% in each of the following subjects: English Language Arts A30, English Language Arts B30, Chemistry 30 and one 30 level mathematics. Criminal records check may be required for practicum placement.

Chemical Technology students acquire knowledge and skills related to chemical analysis and chemical plant operation. They receive training in:

- basic, organic, physical, analytical and environmental chemistry
- analytical instrumentation
- chemical engineering
- recording, processing and reporting data
- communicating results
- servicing and maintaining scientific instruments
- handling and manipulating chemicals
- laboratory quality control and assurance

Chemical technologists can pick and choose from a variety of job possibilities. The mining industry is a major employer, particularly potash and uranium mining companies but also many of the smaller, junior exploration companies. There also are growing opportunities in many other sectors – agriculture, oil and gas, chemical production, environmental protection, ethanol production, food research, occupational health and pulp and paper.

Look for job opportunities as a technologist in commercial, industrial or government laboratories or for positions in chemical product sales. Graduates have found work as laboratory analysts, laboratory technologists, research technical assistants and sales managers.

OIL AND GAS PRODUCTION OPERATOR LEVEL 1 & SAFETY TRAINING

Entrance requirements: Entrance testing and intake interview.

Oil and Gas Production Operators are in high demand and this course provides a complete overview of the oil and gas industry. You will study important industry topics, processes and trends. Topics include: basic petroleum geology, hydrocarbon reservoirs, exploration, survey systems and mineral rights, drilling operations, well completions, artificial lifts, oil and gas production facilities, natural gas processing, refining and transportation, workplace and operational safety, accident/incident investigation and analysis, confined space hazards, risk assessment and management, and lock-out procedures.

RADIATION ENVIRONMENTAL MONITORING TECHNICIAN – certificate

Entrance requirements: Grade 11 with a minimum 60% in English Language Arts A20, English Language Arts B20, Math 20, and Chemistry 20. Preference will be given to Grade 12 graduates with Math 20 and Chemistry 30.

The Radiation and Environmental Monitoring Technician program prepares northern students for employment as entry-level radiation and environmental technicians in uranium mining operations in northern Saskatchewan.

Through classroom instruction, fieldwork, and a summer work placement in industry, the program prepares students for employment as radiation and environmental technicians. Following 10 weeks of program preparation that students must pass to continue, they will study:

- Introduction to Underground Mining
- Radiation Safety, Measurement and Protection
- Environmental Science
- Computer Fundamentals
- Sampling Techniques
- Quality Assurance & Control
- Industrial Chemistry
- Mathematics
- Statistics
- Technical Communications
- Water Treatment & Distribution

Industrial mechanics are also known by other trade names (i.e., maintenance mechanics, millwrights or machine repairmen). Areas of study include:

- drafting and blueprint reading
- lubrication, bearings and seals
- mathematics
- metallurgy and fabrication
- work experience
- rigging, install and alignment
- hand, power, assembly and measuring tools
- welding and cutting

Graduates may find employment in commercial or industrial operations that use machinery. These include wood, cereal, meat processing and power generating plants, hard rock and potash mines, mills and refineries.

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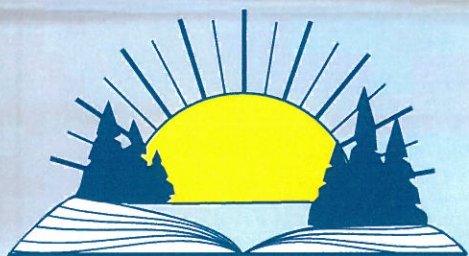
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
